What is Coffee & Kids?

<u>Developmental Milestones</u> <u>Four Year Olds</u>



During our Coffee and Kids discussions many questions from parents have centered around child development. Last month we shared with you information about 3 year olds. This month, let's explore 4 year old milestones.

As my son grew to be 3, 4, and 5 years old I told people I was having more fun with each passing year! At the 4 year old stage your child will be able to think, speak, and create in ways that will make spending time with them so enjoyable! Imaginative play is the best way to help your child explore the world around them. Your child may be more interested in board games and art/craft projects. They will exhibit more self-control and become more independent...which is what we want, but this can create some challenges as well! You will be amazed at the conversations you will be able to have with your 4 year old. I guarantee they will put a smile on your face...OFTEN!!

Here are some general milestones you can look for as your child grows and learns during their 4th year. Please understand, these are just GUIDÉLINES. If your child is not meeting a few of the milestones, don't worry! They are not behind. All children grow and learn at their own pace. If there are significant differences with your child, that would be the time to seek some guidance.

LANGUAGE

- Has mastered basic grammar skills
- Speaks in complete sentences of 4-5 words so you can have a back and forth conversation
- Speaks clearly enough for strangers to understand

MOVEMENT:

• Uses stairs without support

• Should be able to play basic outdoor games where they need to kick, throw overhand, or catch a ball

FINE MOTOR SKILLS (hands/finger skills):

- Learning to brush their teeth
- Draws a person with a body

COGNITIVE:

- Can follow 3 or more directions at a time
- Names some colors, shapes, numbers, and letters

Social/Emotional:

- Shows interest in new experiences
- Getting better at making friends, and is able to cooperate with other children

September 21, 1924

The Northern Wisconsin Tornado Outbreak

On Sunday afternoon September 21, 1924, beginning at about 2:30 pm, several violent storms moved from south eastern Minnesota through northern Wisconsin causing death and destruction across wide swaths of the area.

The National Weather Service and State of Wisconsin records refer to that date as one among the most deadly storm days of the 20th century in this state. There were at least six separate tornadoes reported across northern Wisconsin on that single day. Record keeping and damage assessment methods were inconsistent in the 1920s, but in a little over three hours, 34 people were believed to have lost their lives, and 115 people were injured, most in Thorp in Clark County.

In the late 19th and early 20th century the news about tornadoes was everywhere - except in the weather forecast. From 1887 until 1950, American weathermen were strictly forbidden to use the word "tornado" in the weather report. Back then when science was still struggling to find a scientific explanation behind the storms, tornadoes were considered a dark mysterious force and mentioning them was believed to cause fear and panic. There was no warning of impending danger.

This was the news in Three Lakes after the event.

Letter From Mrs. J.B. Berry To Her Daughter, Mrs. George Summer A Description of the September 21, 1924 Tornado

Monday 2 P.M.

My Dear Ruth,

We are back in the cottage after spending the morning viewing the ruins of Three Lakes. Saturday was a hot close day and the night was close and still. Sunday morning it began to rain - but it was a warm, warm rain with thunder. After dinner the wind began to blow hard and about five, after it had been quite dark for some time, a peculiar light appeared in the west. For a few moments it was quite light, not more than two or three minutes, and then Laurel Lake was in a turmoil and you couldn't see across it. It was all over in four or five minutes and I had just heated the last of Father's beans for him when Mr. Tuttle came up and asked if we were all right. That was a surprise because I had not realized what a bad wind it was.
