Story Hour Then and Now

Story Hour has been a part of the library in Three Lakes longer than the library has been called the Demmer, and longer than there has been kindergarten Camp Elementary school. Soon that position became at Three Lakes Elementary. In fact, the success of Story Hour was one of the driving factors that brought 5-year-old education to the community.

In 1964 Mrs. Barbara Bauknecht (now Holtz) invited families and more than 30 children registered for the first Story Hour session. This led to the development of the library's children's book collection and when teachers saw how prepared Story Hour children were for 1st grade learning, kindergarten began in 1967.

The Demmer Library was built in 1971 and benefitted from the lower level that was added specifically to provide space for the Story Hour program. In 2018 that original structure saved as much as a million dollars in structure costs. We wouldn't have this much space without the 1971 Story Hour level.

More changes came when Barbara Holtz retired in 1995. The Three Lakes School District and the town of enrolled in Story Hour through these three programs Sugar Camp agreed to financially support the program and the 4K classrooms are brimming!

and the first Demmer Story Hour coordinator was hired. Story Hour continued at the Demmer and Sugar the Demmer children's librarian.

In 2019 retired and beloved elementary instructors created Coffee & Kids, a program to support the big people who are helping our littles learn to read and love books. They meet during Story Hour so everybody has time to learn.

Now in 2022, 58 years later, we have a new evolution: adding Story Hour in the Three Lakes 4K classroom. This pilot project has renewed a dialogue about Story Hour and early childhood literacy between the library and the school. Children who might not otherwise be exposed to the library are meeting Ms. Candice, their local children's librarian, and learning about what the public library has to offer them.

This is even more exciting as the Three Lakes area experiences a baby boom. There are now 75 children



<u>Developmental Milestones</u> <u>Five Year Olds</u>

During our Coffee and Kids discussions many questions from parents have centered around child development. In previous months we shared with you information about 3 and 4 year olds. This month, we will explore the world of the five year old.

Exciting times are ahead as your child begins the official start of their educational career. Your 5-year-old is becoming more independent, which means they enjoy being around other family members and friends. They might test boundaries or ask to do things on their own. It's important to reinforce good behavior through praise, and to set clear limits so that your child knows what to expect.

Here are some general milestones you can look for as your child grows and learns between the ages of five and six. It's important to remember, these are just guidelines. All children grow and learn at their own pace. It is also important to try and not compare your child to siblings and playmates.

Speech/Language

• Has a sentence length of 5-6 words

Has a vocabulary of around 2000 words

• Defines objects by their use (you eat with a fork) and can tell what objects are made of

• Knows spatial relations like "on top", "behind", "far" and "near"

Gross Motor

- Runs lightly on toes
- Walks on balance beam
- Can cover 2 feet hopping

Fine Motor

- Cuts out simple shapes
- Copies a triangle
- Traces a diamond





Cognitive

- Retells a story from a picture book with reasonable accuracy
- Names some letters and numbers
- Rote counts to ten

Social/Emotional

- Chooses own friends
- Engages in cooperative play with other children
- Follows rules or takes turns when playing games with other children





Three Lakes Museum

Early Main Street - McNinch's - a Town Landmark

Frank McNinch, a logger from Canada, arrived in Three Lakes in the 1880's after the railroad was laid through town. This very early picture shows him posing with a well-dressed group of men in front of *F. McNinch's Place* – obviously selling beer and whiskey.

The earliest years in Three Lakes were some pretty rough and tumble times and it seems every business supplemented their income by offering rooms for board and a saloon of sorts for drink. Lumberjacks coming to town after a payday added mayhem to the mix.



"Local Option" at the polls determined the town's "wet or dry" status and it changed yearly causing the saloon business to be very unstable. It is understandable that by the late 1890"s Frank and Mary McNinch eventually stopped applying for a saloon license and went into selling general merchandise.

Business was probably good for them. Their business was located on the northeast corner of Main Street (now Superior) and what is now Highway 45 making them the closest merchant to the train depot. The train coming from the south carrying lake residents and tourists arrived early in the morning and the store was always open for stocking up on provisions that might be needed for a week or a month or more. Frank McNinch had a horse and wagon ready on the side lot to help cart people, luggage and supplies to the nearest boat launch headed out to cottages and resorts.



In 1908 the McNinch business suffered a major blow when FS Campbell's two story brick store right next to theirs was destroyed in a late night explosion. Insurance was woefully short on covering the cost of building repairs. In this photograph probably taken in the summer of 1909 or 1910 looking east on Main Street, the damaged McNinch building can be seen to the far left.

Can You Be a Historical Detective?



Frank and Mary McNinch eventually recovered and continued to run their general store on that corner.

This image from the museum archives does not identify the two people in this store picture, and the picture of *McNinch's Place* above does not identify Frank McNinch. But comparing this man to the men in the saloon picture might lead you to believe you can identify him. With that information you might feel confident enough to make a positive ID if you could just find another image. Do you have Information about McNinch's?

On September 21, 1924 a cyclone tore through the town and countryside around Three Lakes. The McNinch store suffered extensive damage and can be seen without a roof and two walls with canned goods still sitting on shelves on the remaining walls!





The building just to the east of McNinch's, sustaining some damage, was the *Hotel Badger* built on the old FS Campbell lot. Cy Williams drew up plans for the hotel which was completed in 1920.

Looking east on Superior Street probably in the late 1920's, recovering again from another disaster, the McNinch building with the nice porch can be seen on the far left. Sometime during this period, the Dobbs family purchased the property, remodeling the building and the business continued as a hardware store on that corner. The hardware store expanded and eventually *The Chalet Hotel* replaced the *Hotel Badger*.
