### **Genealogy Tip**


The genealogy tip of the month is about how to narrow down your Google research:


When using Google for genealogy research, try this idea to find certain page titles: Use allintitle:

#### **STEM**

(Caution...this information may cause your child to have fun learning!)

For years, schools have been using STEM activities with students. What is STEM?
The letters STEM stand for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. (Sometimes you'll see STEAM which is the same thing, but adds the "A" for Art.)

Now, don't get worried…I'm not trying to imply that you need to teach your children these academic subjects at home! Many STEM activities, especially for young children, may not even look like math or science. Instead, the activities focus on the types of thinking needed to work on topics like these. STEM activities allow children to experiment with their "world", take in information, analyze that information, then use what they've learned to draw conclusions or solve problems. All of us do these things all day long! In other words, STEM activities help children develop skills they'll use the rest of their lives.

Children generally love STEM because the activities tend to be hands-on and fun. In addition, the children are "in charge". They make the decisions and take ownership of whatever it is they're working on.

The hard part for you as the parent is...not helping. The goal here is for your child to try lots of different ways to accomplish a task and figure out the best way to achieve their end goal. Are they going to make mistakes? YES. But, resist the urge to "fix" those mistakes for them. You can encourage them. You can ask questions. You can help them organize their thinking, but resist the temptation of getting too involved.

How can you provide STEM opportunities? One way is to put together a STEM kit. Again, DON'T PANIC. This is easier than you may think, and these activities are so much fun your child will never know they are learning!!

While there are many STEM kits available for purchase, you can easily make one using materials you will likely find around your house. Kits can be as simple or complex as you like. You can create a kit for almost any age level, and you can tailor it to the interests of your child(ren). Do you have paper and crayons? Legos? Toilet paper tubes and paper clips? If so, you can make a STEM kit! You will find several links below. On the Demmer Library website you will find a small list of links with some online resources to help you create your own STEM activities. HAVE FUN!!

### Celebrating Basketball and Three Lakes

Basketball and Three Lakes both had their beginnings at the end of the 19th century, 120 plus years ago. As the popularity of the game spread across the country, Three Lakes was eventually playing the game at the high school level too. Blue Jays can take pride in the fact that both boys and girls participated in the sport. It must have been an exciting time!

Today Three Lakes is proud Blue Jay country. At the girls February 3rd game and the boys February 6th game, 100 years of basketball history in our community will be recognized. Come and celebrate this historical milestone with our teams and basketball alumni.

One hundred years ago during the 1922-23 school year, the Three Lakes schools were in transition. The two story wood frame building, located where the Demmer Library now stands, had served the town since 1894. A contract for demolition had been agreed to and the old wooden school was sold for \$5 to Eddie Danowski who dismantled it piece by piece and resold the materials.





It was being replaced by a new modern brick building built where our school stands today. This school had classrooms for 12 grades, a band room, a home economics room, and a gymnasium in the basement. The gym doubled as the cafeteria and was affectionately called "the Pit" with a wooden floor installed by the shop class and the basketball team. On the top floor was the Principal's office, the library, and art room.

As amazing as the fact is that the wood floor was installed with help from students is the fact that it lasted until 1976 and only had to be replaced due to water damage. That hardwood hosted years of basketball and community events.

It is believed that the completion date for the new brick school was to have begun at the start of the school year in the fall of 1922. For whatever reasons, students first entered the building in the fall of 1923. But the basketball craze sweeping the country had already reached Three Lakes and we had teams ready to take on neighboring communities before that new gym was ready.

School records from 100 years ago are incomplete, like a jigsaw puzzle missing pieces. Some of what we know about that first season of basketball is from museum archives and stories in *The Pine the Plow and the Pioneer, vol 2.* Newspaper articles show games were played on the road, but where did they practice and play at home while they waited to move into the new school during the 1922-23 season?

Local historian Les Anderson was able to find the following December 1922 *Eagle River Review* articles to provide a few more details.

# Basket Ball Teams Win. Both basket ball teams from the Eagle River high school won their games last Friday evening with major scores. The regular team of boys who played Elcho in that village cleaned up with a score of 64 to 15. The Freshmen girls played at Three Lakes and won by a 32 to 5 score. The regulars will play Friday evening here against Argonne, while the second team plays Three Lakes.

#### TOOK BOTH THE GAMES

Eagle River Teams Trim Argonne and Three Lakes in Good Games of Basket Ball Friday Evening.

With victories going to both basket ball teams last Friday night in the opera house in this village, it now gives them both a hundred percent record so far this year. So far the first team has been playing brilliant ball, and has found no team anywhere near their equal. In the Friday night game Argonne went down to defeat by a score of 39 to 2.

The second team of Eagle River played the same evening, and cleaned up Three Lakes 17 to 12. It is said that a game between Crandon and Eagle River will be played here this evening.

Eagle River Review, 20 Dec 1922

These was a scrappy preliminary between the Three Lakes High and Eagle High's second team that resulted in another victory for the local school by a score of 17 to 12. During the first period the teams played to a tie, 6 to 6, with Three lakes having the better of it in teamwork and snappy playing. But Eagle came back strong in the latter half pulling out by a five point margin when time was called.

It was Three Lakes' first basket ball game with an outside team, the four year high school having just been organized in the neighboring town this year. They have a good little team and when Eagle goes down there for a return game they will have to hump right along to make it a win.

Eagle River Review, 21 Dec 1922

The December 20 article mentions playing at the opera house probably referencing a location in Eagle River.

Three Lakes also had a building called the Opera House that hosted community events. The December 13 article states the girls played in Three Lakes, and the December 21 article states Eagle River would play a return game in Three Lakes. When looking at the possibilities in town where a game of basketball could be played in December, the Opera House may have been the only one. That building, located in the empty Loonery lot next to the old railroad tracks, was lost to the tornado in September 1924.
